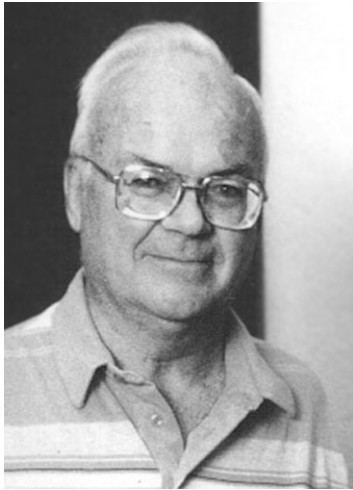


ELLIOTT M. "MR. ED" BAILEY
